

Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art, Exterior

Five glass volumes ("lenses") were designed as a complimentary contrast to the existing 1933 limestone building. The concept for the nighttime image was to create glowing lanterns that

would illuminate the exterior spaces and sculpture between the lenses—minimizing the need for additional site lighting. During the day, the lenses reflect the sky conditions—appearing opaque on overcast days and glistening against the sun. As the day ends, the "lenses" begin to glow from within providing a soft light for the surrounding site and have become an iconic image for Kansas City.
